On Saturday, November 17, the "Green Fields of America," a traditional Irish music and dance tour, will appear at Northeastern University in Chicago. The group is composed of American traditional Irish singers, dancers and musicians performing on fiddle, flute, concertina, button accordian, tin whistle, banjo, mandolin and uillean pipes. The tour is sponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts, and is traveling to twelve other cities.

The performers are: All-World stepdancing champion Michael Flatley, stepdancer Donnie Golden, All-Ireland champion fiddler Brendon Mulvihill, All-Ireland champion accordian player Billy McComiskey, Andy O'Brien, singing and guitar, Mike Rafferty (originally from Galway), flute, Al Purcell, uillean pipes, and Mick Moloney, mandolin and tenor banjo.

The concert starts at 8 pm and costs \$5. There's a large parking lot,

so parking should be no problem.

A series of workshops is being planned for the afternoon. tentatively scheduled to begin at 1 pm but due to the Allegheny Airline strike, might begin at 3 pm. The exact time will be determined about a

week before the concert, depending on how the strike is going.

The workshops will involve the instruments kisted above. The cost is \$2. The coordinator of the Chicago stop of the tour is Noel Rice, and he asks that people sign up beforehand for the particular instrument workshop they want to attend, so that arrangements can be made for rooms and chairs, etc. You can call him at (312) 564-1338, or call our house (257-2966, Debbie, Ken, or Larry). I'm willing to keep a list of people and workshops and phone it all in at once.

There's rumor, too, of a party in the works afterwards with people Debbie

from Urbana, Chicago and St. Paul.

SPECIAL EVENT_LOU KILLEN

The Wild Hog's Special Event for December will actually take place in November -- a concert by Louis Killen, one of Britain's leading folk artists, on Thursday, November 29, at 8 pm.

In addition, the Madison Folk Music Society will sponsor a free workshop on British industrial songs by Lou Killen on Friday, November 30, at 2 pm

in the Memorial Union.

Killen, who has toured with the Clancy Brothers, has long been recognized as one of the foremost singers of British traditional ballads. Born in Gateshead-on-Tyne of Irish parents, and now living in the U.S., Killen was deeply involved in the British Folk Revival and is an immensely popular and respected performer in England. He accompanies himself chiefly on the English concerting, occasionally uses the guitar or banjo, and plays the penny whistle with special skill.

Of one New York concert, New York Times critic, John S. Wilson, wrate, "Mr. Killen is a master of the traditional English ballad, a master of the chantey.. of the hunting song, of the Irish song--a master, in fact, of almost any kind of fine singing ... a superb performer with an extra-

ordinary repertory..."

Killen has a great many recordings, most of them for Topic Records. Be sure to join us on Thursday, November 29, and Friday, November 30 for a concert and workshop by Lou Killen.

- In celebration of the artist's ninetieth birthday, this film looks at the sensuous, mystical paintings of desert, flower, shells, bone, clouds, and stone that have come out of O'Keeffe's years spent in New Mexico. Born in Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, she studied at the Art Institute of Chicago, at the University of Virginia and at Columbia University. A portrait of one of America's premier artists. 1977.
- 11-21-79 (Wednesday) Bohrod--Color, 28 minutes
 Details the life and work as a major American artist, Aaron
 Bohrod who spent 25 years as artist-in residence at the University
 of Wisconsin in Madison. 1973.
- Union Maids -- B&W, 51 minutes
 A cocumentary of the birth and building of the labor movement in Chicago in the 1930's and the role of three women who were organizers. The film is a tribute to the courageand power of working class women everywhere. Based on the book RANK AND FILE by Alice & Straughton Lynd. 1976
